THE GUIDING LIGHT FROM THE GROTTO 32ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME MARK 12:38-44

NOVEMBER: WE PRAY FOR OUR DEAD AND ASK THE SAINTS FOR THEIR INTERCESSION

During this fall season, nature points us toward death. As the leaves become radiant with golds and reds, we know they are dying, with many fallen to the ground. Nature reminds us that all of life is dying. From the moment we are born, we are moving toward death. If we lived only a secular life, we might feel hopeless. However, as people of faith, we know that our life does not end in death. Our Church guides us toward the new life to come. St. Paul tells us in his letter to the Thessalonians, "Now we do not want you to be uninformed, believers, about those who are asleep [in death], so that you will not grieve [for them] as

the others do who have no hope" (1 TH 4:13). As Christians, we can grieve with hope, knowing that the Gospel and the resurrection of Jesus Christ have transformed our grief into hope.

Last week, we celebrated two days that remind us of the hope the risen Christ brings to each of us: All Saints' Day on November 1 and All Souls' Day on November 2.

All Saints' Day reminds us that we have people just like us whom the Church officially calls Saints. There are also people we know in our hearts as saints because of the lives they lived. Saints are sinners who never gave up. Even though they sinned, they never gave up on loving God,

forgiving others, and holding onto hope. The Saints saw themselves as sons and daughters of God—not in the future but now. They saw themselves as belonging to a life greater than themselves.

Even though they had a past, the Saints longed for the future. They believed and lived out the passage from 1 Jn 3:1-3, which states, "what we shall be later has not yet come to light. We know that when it comes to light, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is." The Saints are our role models and heroes, reminding us that we are all children of God and that we too can be where they are today, with God in Heaven. May we take the time to walk

in their footsteps and ask them to intercede for us each day. We can learn from Saints like St. Therese of Lisieux, who said, "I will spend my Heaven doing good on earth." Who is your favorite Saint to whom you pray for intercession?

On All Souls' Day, November 2, we remember and pray for all the dead who have gone before us, especially those souls in Purgatory. Even though a soul may be in Purgatory, they are still a part of the Church Suffering. Purgatory is the state where the soul undergoes purification before entering the fullness of Heaven. Think of Purgatory as a waiting room for Heaven. Through Jesus Christ, we are given the power to help those who have

died through our prayers, to renew broken connections, and to express gratitude or forgiveness. Never underestimate what your prayers and charity can do to help release a soul from Purgatory into Heaven. During the month of November, may we take the time to pray, visit a cemetery, have a remembrance of a loved one at Mass, or light a candle in a loved one's name. We invite you to look at the Book of Remembrance, which marks the passing of loved ones from our parish since late last October.

Please take advantage of the All Souls' Novena Envelopes, where we priests can pray for your loved ones at Mass in a special way. John's Gospel, chapter 6, tells us that we do not have to wait until after death for

eternal life. The glory of eternal life begins now, in and through Jesus Christ, and is fulfilled after our death. But we must seek, live, and believe in Him. May we commend all our loved ones to the Lord. Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. May their souls and all the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

May God bless you, and may Mary keep you and your families always.



REFLECTIONS: St. Martin of Tours: A Model of Compassion and Service

St. Martin of Tours was one of the first saints to be recognized without being a martyr. He was canonized because of his holy life and his many acts of kindness. His story of sharing his cloak with a beggar became well known. After his death, people believed that Martin had done many miracles. His reputation for good ness spread quickly, and he became a saint.

St. Martin's feast day is celebrated on November 11. This date became important because of his connection to peace. The signing of the armistice that ended World War I also took place on November 11. Because of this, St. Martin's feast day is also linked to remembering peace and the end of conflict.

The legacy of St. Martin of Tours is one of kindness, service, and humility. He shows us how to live a life that helps others and honors God. His example still inspires people to care for the poor, seek peace, and live with humility.

As a bishop, Martin remained humble, living among the poor and always putting others first. He was known for his care for those in need and for standing firm in his beliefs, even when it was difficult. His life challenges us to think about how we treat those around us, especially the poor and suffering. Are we willing to live simply and generously as he did?

St. Martin of Tours is a great example of someone who lived out his faith in real and practical ways. He didn't wait for a perfect moment to do good — he acted whenever he saw a need. His life encourages us to live with compassion, to listen to God's call, and to be generous in serving others.







and all who come after us-





OLIVEWOOD HANDCRAFTED FROM THE HOLY LAND A TRADITIONAL ART AND LIVELIHOOD FOR HOLY LAND CHRISTIANS

The handicrafts trade evolved as a cultural tradition of Christians in the Holy Land for many centuries. This indigenous form of art has since become an industry of great importance to the local people of the Holy Land who rely on it for livelihood, and to Christian pilgrims from all around the world whose holy pilgrimage can be memorialized for a lifetime in cherished olive wood or mother of pearl souvenirs. The olive wood carving market is the major source of income in the Bethlehem area. More than 65 percent of the income of the community in Bethlehem comes from this work.

In recent years, however, the holy crafts trade has suffered many hardships due to social and economical pressures. Because of a sharp fall in tourism and also as a result of diminishing numbers of craftsmen who leave their traditional trade and emigrate due to the difficult conditions in their homeland, the Holy Land handicraft market is facing serious danger, and so is the Christian community in the Land. Sixty five years ago the Christians represented more than 28% of the total population in the Holy Land, today they are less than 1.5%. The loss of Christians in the land of Christianity's birth will represent a tragedy of immeasurable proportions for the billions of Christians worldwide. Thank you for your vital support for a Christian tradition and in protecting this very important culture and industry.
